Introducing the Redesign of the Social Security Statement

The Social Security Statement (Statement) is one of our most effective tools to educate your constituents about their earnings record and future Social Security benefits. In FY 2021, we provided more than 76 million Statements to the public via mail and our my Social Security online portal.

We are pleased to announce that we released a redesign of the *Statement* in early October. We based the *Statement* redesign on research; feedback we've received; and input from advocates, other Federal agencies, and the general public.

Now, your constituents will be able to quickly find information in the *Statement*, whether they access it online or receive a hard copy through the mail. We made the redesigned *Statement* available online to *my* Social Security account holders on October 2, and began mailing the *Statement* on October 6.

The new Statement:

- is shorter;
- uses plain language and visuals to make it easier to skim, read, and understand,
- displays a bar chart of personalized retirement benefit estimates for up to 9 ages at which benefits can start; and
- includes up to two supplemental fact sheets targeted to the recipient's age group and earnings situation.

The *Statement* is intended to help your constituents understand how much they and their family members may receive in disability, survivors, and retirement benefits. It also provides a record of the individual's earnings history. We encourage your constituents to review their earnings history at least once a year and let us know if they find an error.

Our Compassionate
Allowances (CAL) quickly
identify medical conditions and
diseases that, by definition,
meet Social Security's
standards for disability benefits.
Due to the severe nature of
these conditions, disability
claims based on CAL are
often allowed based solely
on medical confirmation of
a diagnosis.

On August 16, 2021, Kilolo Kijakazi, Acting Commissioner of Social Security, announced 12 new CAL conditions, helping to reduce waiting time for more individuals with the most serious conditions.

The Effect of Pandemic-Related Assistance Payments on SSI **Eligibility and Monthly Payment Amounts**

Some of your constituents may be concerned about how federal pandemic-related assistance payments can affect their Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program benefits.

Much of the new pandemic-related federal assistance is treated as disaster assistance under our rules. We do not count disaster assistance when we determine SSI eligibility or benefit amounts.

The following payments will not affect an individual's eligibility for SSI benefits or SSI monthly payment amounts:

- · Economic Impact Payments;
- Expanded Unemployment Insurance Benefits;
- Emergency Assistance for Renters and Homeowners;
- Housing Assistance and Supportive Services Programs for Native Americans;
- Emergency Assistance for Farmers and Ranchers;
- Support for Foster Youth and Families during the Pandemic;
- Emergency Assistance to Children and Families through the Pandemic Emergency Assistance Fund: and
- COVID-19 Funeral Assistance.

Some forms of pandemic-related assistance provided by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act, the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021, the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, and the Families First Coronavirus Response Act do not meet disaster assistance criteria, such as child tax credits, Low-Income Home Energy Assistance, or the Low-Income Home Water Assistance Program. We will follow our regular rules for treatment of these payments.

Expansion of Enumeration Beyond Entry

The Enumeration Beyond Entry (EBE) program allows noncitizens who apply for temporary work authorization with U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) to also apply for an original or replacement Social Security Number (SSN) card using the same form (Form 1-765 Application for Employment Authorization). Beginning August 9, 2021, in partnership with USCIS, we expanded EBE to include individuals applying for lawful permanent resident (LPR) status via an Application to Register Permanent Residence or Adjust Status (Form I-485). EBE allows us to use the information USCIS collected and verified to automatically assign SSNs to noncitizens lawfully present in the United States who were granted temporary work authorization or LPR status. EBE eliminates the need to visit a Social Security office.
